SEVEN CAN-FED BABIES DIE

ALL OF THEM USED THE SAME BRAND OF CONDENSED MILK.

More Enterocolitis Already This Year Than During Entire Twelve Months of 1912.

Of the eleven deaths of children under two years of age from enterocolitis, which have been reported to the health department this year, subsequent investigations disclosed that seven used one particular brand of condensed milk. Dr. Crull of the health department, while he is not yet thoroughly convinced that this is more than a coincidence says that careful investigations will be made of every case of the disease reported in the future and of the same rate of mortality among the users of this brand of milk is found, he proposes barring its sale in Fort Wayne.

In the year 1912, Fort Wayne set a world's record in freedom from enterocolitis and health authorities all over the country in noting the conditions ascribed to it to the purity of the milk and water supplies. In that year there were but six deaths, while already this year there have been nearly twice that many.

Every time a case of enterocolitis is reported in an infant under two years, or what are known as "milk babies", the health department institutes a vigorous investigation calculated to ascertain a complete history of the food eaten, ventilation of rooms, kind of water used, etc. It was by this means that it was found that one particular brand of condensed milk was the sole food for seven of the babies that died.

Another Request For Ordinance. Every few weeks some health department in the United States writes the local health department asking a copy of Fort Wayne's model health ordinance. Yesterday a letter was received from Greenfield, Ill., asking for the ordinance and stating that it had been recommended as the best instrument of its character in the country.

Milk Was Sour. Dr. Gillie Seize 125 Gallons Off Interurban.

Dr. George Gillie this morning condemned 125 gallons of milk consigned to local dairy companies from farmers living along the Decatur interurban. The milk was placed on the loading platforms at 6 o'clock this morning, but did not reach the city until 11 o'clock, and of course by that time it was sour.

THE MACEDONIANS SHOW PATRIOTISM FOR COUNTRY

ALL OVER THE WORLD THEY ARE SORE O'ER BALKAN AFFAIR.

WANT WAR CONTINUED

Macedonians of United States Pass Resolutions Condemning Recent Balkan Treaty.

A new phase to the Balkan situation came to light today, through a local source, when it was learned that the Macedonians all over the world deeply resent the action which will be the result of the recent Balkan treaty.

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which war we, the Macedonians, fought most vigorously and with our help Turkey was defeated;

"Whereas, The end of this Balkan-Macedonia, but most generous division of our country and people between Serbia and Greece, and our nation was compelled to submit to the Serbian and the Greek governments, a government more tyrannical than the Turkish government; and

"Whereas, The Serbian and the Greek governments now kill our virtue and honor of our sisters, mothers and wives, and molest our children, all of which inhuman acts aim at the entire destruction of our national existence in Macedonia, and

"Whereas, The present unjust division of our country was caused by the European diplomacy, and if the same exists in future, there will always be internal revolutions and disturbances which will keep all the Balkan states in readiness to be used by the European powers in disastrous clash;

"Whereas, The peace in the Balkans is only the freedom of Macedonia, and the freedom based on the principle: 'Macedonia for the Macedonians.'"

"We, the Macedonians in the United States of America, with all the vigor in us, protest against the unjust division of Macedonia and the tyranny of the Serbian and Greek governments in Macedonia;

"We appeal to the European powers to declare the conference in Bucharest, Roumania, between the representatives of the Balkan states unjust, and to demand autonomy of Macedonia;

"We declare to all the nations of the world, that if the freedom of Macedonia is not granted soon, we will continue our struggle and fight for the freedom of our country, and we will all die or be free. We cry: 'Give us freedom or give us death!'"

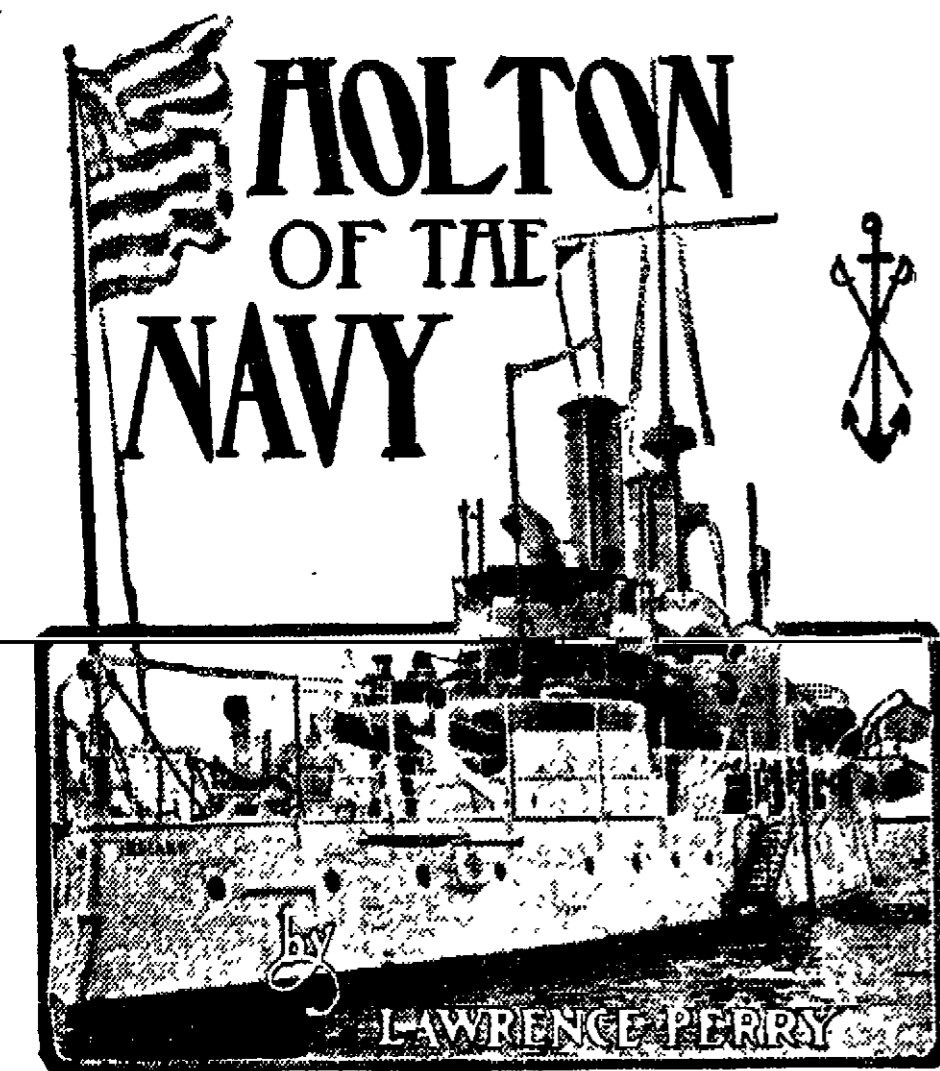
