ONE OF THE PROBLEMS OF THE DAY.

By looking back over only a few months of recent history you will be able to call up the fact that the floods of nothing. The gang must begin to feel lonely. and many of those in Iowa and Missourl suffered as heavily. Depots and warehouses were inundated or swept away, tracks and bridges were destroyed, and the freight traffic of several states was paralzed for two weeks.

The direct damage to railroad property represented only a small percentage of the loss by flood. Valuable freight in immense quantities, in transit or in warehouses awaiting shipment, was damaged or utterly destroyed. Large districts in cities and thousands of square miles of farm lands were devastated, the floods of two weeks states along the western rivers to the extent of \$30,000,000. So complete was the destruction of the means of communication that scores of cities were for nine days without a railway train, without mail, and some of them without telegraph or telephone communication with the outside world. 


