WAR CENTRE MOVES INTO GALLIOLI

Turkish Force Landed on Marmara Coast and Heavy Fighting Now Expected.

Clash Between Armies Looked Upon as Being the Decisive Battle of Conflict.

London, Feb. 10.—A despatch to the Daily News from Constantinople says that the Turkish force landed on the Marmara coast, and heavy fighting is expected to take place. The despatch says that the decisive battle of the war, as the Turks are concentrating their forces for the retention of Gallipoli.

ENVER BEY'S HOPELESS ATTEMPT.

London, Feb. 10.—The Constantinople correspondent of The Times confirms the report that Haki Pasha is proceeding to London. It is supposed that he is to replace Rechad Pasha on the resumption of peace negotiations.

An uncensored despatch to the Daily News describes Enver Bey's enterprise as a hopelessly pathetic muddle, like Rodzestvensky's oruise to death at Tsushima. No arrangements were made to land horses and artillery, which will probably be lost, and a heavy loss of life is likely to be entailed.

ALLIES' VICTORIOUS ATTACK ON SCUTARI

Joint Army Captured Stronghold and Sank Two Turkish Steamers On the Lake.

Podgoritza, Montenegro, Feb. 8.—A general attack by the combined Montenegrin and Serbian armies was made on the Turkish fortress of Scutari at 10 o'clock this morning. King Nicholas of Montenegro is personally directing the operations. The allied Montenegrin Serbian army did effective work, silencing a Turkish battery on the mountain. The infantry followed up the bombardment by storming the hill at the point of the bayonet, driving the Turks out of their works and capturing the position.

TURKISH NAVY SEEN IN SEVERE ACTION

Sofia, Feb. 9.—An official statement issued this afternoon says that the Turks, on Saturday, took the offensive against the Bulgarians before Bulair in the Gallipoli peninsula. A fierce engagement ensued, lasting several hours, and finally the Bulgarians repulsed the Turks, pursuing them to the Bulair forts. Many wounded were left on the field.

London, Feb. 9.—According to unofficial information received here tonight, the Turkish attempted further operations on the coast of the Sea of Marmora today, and it is believed that as a result of the check they received at Chatken they have abandoned the idea of effecting a landing.

ALLIES ACCUSED OF GHASTLY OUTRAGES

Turkish Women Utter Protest to European Sovereigns and Give Jewels to Help the Cause.

Constantinople, Feb. 8.—A Turkish reconnaissance has reached Cherkessk, 25 miles to the west of Chatalla, along the line of the railway, which apparently is free from Bulgarians. A committee of representatives of the Society for the Elevation of Women and of the Red Cross have sent a letter to the sovereigns of Europe calling their attention to "those shameless hordes which are endeavoring to disguise under the shadow of patriotism the most heinous crimes of assassinations and outrages ever witnessed in a war in Europe in modern times."

ALLIES ACCUSED OF GHASTLY OUTRAGES

Turkish Women Utter Protest to European Sovereigns and Give Jewels to Help the Cause.

A meeting of Turkish women at Scutari today discussed means for assisting the national defence. Patriotic speeches were made, and jewels to the value of \$10,000 were donated to the cause.

TURKS REPULSED IN CHATALJA ADVANCES

Regiment Cut Up With Heavy Slaughter in Bayonet Charge and Artillery Defeated.

Sofia, Feb. 8.—All attempts on the part of the Turks to assume the offensive at the Chatalla lines have been repulsed. A semi-official despatch giving details of yesterday's fighting, says that the Turks advanced in three columns. The first, consisting of six batteries, supported by the guns of the Gabaubina, and the warships moored in the Bay of Chatalla, attacked the Bulgarian positions at Arnatucked, but were driven back by a counter attack. The second column of two battalions was obliged to retire, beyond the Karatair river. A column of one regiment was routed with great slaughter by the bayonet charges. In the Derkos district the attempts of the Turks were also repulsed and they withdrew to their original positions.

TURKS REPULSED IN CHATALJA ADVANCES

Regiment Cut Up With Heavy Slaughter in Bayonet Charge and Artillery Defeated.

The bombardment of Adrianople continues. Heavy Slaughter of Turks. Sofia, Feb. 8.—An official statement by the war office today declared that the Turks have been killed by the Bulgarians in the Gallipoli peninsula, and 10,000 taken prisoners. The Turkish army in the peninsula early today was retreating in panic, the wildest confusion prevailing all along the line. The Bulgarian cavalry was in pursuit of the Turks, and many were cut down as they ran.

TURKS REPULSED IN CHATALJA ADVANCES

Regiment Cut Up With Heavy Slaughter in Bayonet Charge and Artillery Defeated.

London, Feb. 8.—Enver Bey, chief of the Turkish general staff, according to the correspondent of the Daily News, left Constantinople Friday night with a force of picked and seasoned troops. His destination was kept secret. A despatch to the Daily Telegraph from Belgrade reports that the governor of Scutari has been killed in the Serbian bombardment of that city.

Sofia, Feb. 8.—In reply to an address of thanks presented to Theodore Roosevelt on the occasion of an article published by him, praising Bulgaria, Colonel Roosevelt has written to Dr. S. Daneff, president of the chamber of deputies and head of the Bulgarian peace delegation, expressing warm admiration for the patriotic sense of citizenship of the whole Bulgarian nation and his pleasure at the magnificent work accomplished by the Bulgarian troops, whose victories have delivered civilized humanity from the oppressive burden of Turkish domination in Europe.

ROOSEVELT WANTS TURKS OUT OF EUROPE

Hopes for Fall of Adrianople to End the Existence of Ottoman Scourge.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 8.—The mission to St. Petersburg of the Prince Hohenlohe-Waldenburg-Schillingensfeld, who last Monday presented to Emperor Francis-Joseph of Austria, has been a complete success, according to the Retchau, which adds that it received its information from a source which is thoroughly reliable. The newspaper says that the conversations between Sergius Sazonoff, the Russian foreign minister, and the counsellor of the Austrian embassy, acting for the ambassador, who is ill, on the points raised in the letter of Emperor Francis-Joseph, have not brought out such vital differences, in the views of the representatives of the two countries, as to prevent a settlement of the questions in dispute.

BRITISH LIBERALS OPPOSE BORDEN PLAN

Asquith and Churchill Approached to Change Attitude to Help Canadian Party.

Fielding Credited as Being Head of Organization Against Naval Policy.

London, Feb. 10.—The Daily Telegraph this morning publishes a startling announcement from a correspondent to the effect that a number of the government supporters are taking concerted action to defeat Premier Borden's naval policy. They are anxious to do all in their power to rehabilitate the scheme of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and are working in close association with Hon. W. S. Fielding, who came to this country immediately after the introduction of the Borden naval bill.

BRITISH LIBERALS OPPOSE BORDEN PLAN

Asquith and Churchill Approached to Change Attitude to Help Canadian Party.

These M.P.'s have already seen Mr. Asquith and Winston Churchill with a view to prevailing upon them to alter their attitude towards Mr. Borden's scheme and thus assisting the Liberal party in the Dominion. Their action has already found expression in the ministerial press, it being urged that we should discourage gifts to the British navy and encourage the Dominions to build coal navies.

CO-OPERATION IS NEED OF EMPIRE

Australian Delegates to England Discuss Naval Problem at Luncheon in Their Honor.

London, Feb. 9.—The naval league yesterday entertained Sir Joseph Ward, ex-governor of New Zealand, at a luncheon, during which the relations of the Dominions to the mother country were discussed. In responding to the toast of his health, Sir Joseph said that he looked forward to the time when the imperial fleet would attain such perfection, and become so efficient that other nations would hesitate to try conclusions with the British empire.

RUSSIA'S STRENGTH IN PERSIA

London, Feb. 8.—In reply to a question in the commons today as to the relative strength of Russia and Great Britain in Persia, Sir Edward Grey stated that there were no less than 18,400 Russian troops in Northern Persia. In Southern Persia, he added, there were only 1,300 British troops.

BIRCH HELPS CHINA

London, Feb. 8.—It was announced in the commons yesterday that the firm of Birch, Crisp and Company, Limited, had already loaned the Chinese government the sum of \$2,000,000 in order to tide the Republic over their present pressing requirements.

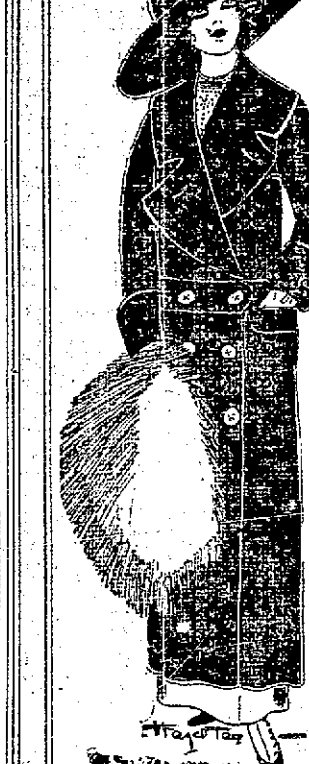
